The Collect

Almighty God, you have broken the tyranny of sin and have sent the Spirit of your Son into our hearts whereby we call you Father: give us grace to dedicate our freedom to your service, that we and all creation may be brought to the glorious liberty of the children of God; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The Old Testament Reading: Jeremiah 28: 5–9

A reading from the book of the prophet Jeremiah

The prophet Jeremiah spoke to the prophet Hananiah in the presence of the priests and all the people who were standing in the house of the LORD; and the prophet Jeremiah said, 'Amen! May the LORD do so; may the LORD fulfil the words that you have prophesied, and bring back to this place from Babylon the vessels of the house of the LORD, and all the exiles. But listen now to this word that I speak in your hearing and in the hearing of all the people. The prophets who preceded you and me from ancient times prophesied war, famine, and pestilence against many countries and great kingdoms. As for the prophet who prophesies peace, when the word of that prophet comes true, then it will be known that the LORD has truly sent the prophet.'

The New Testament Reading: Romans 6: 12-end

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

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When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gradual Hymn: Seek ye first the Kingdom of God

Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you: Allelu, alleluia. *Alleluia, Allelu, alleluia.*

Ask, and it shall be given unto you, seek, and ye shall find, knock, and it shall be opened up to you: Allelu, alleluia. You shall not live by bread alone, but by ev'ry word that proceeds from the mouth of God: Allelu, alleluia.

The Gospel Reading: St Matthew 10: 40-end

Hear the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St Matthew

Jesus said to the twelve:

'Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me. Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward; and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous; and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple—truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward.'

Father, during this time of racial unrest we pray for your healing on the divisions, prejudices, hatred, and anxiety present in society, here and across the world. Grant your wisdom and discernment to all who strive for a future where all are treated equally, respected, and cherished. Lord, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer**.

Father, relieve and comfort those who suffer from any kind of sickness at this time. We pray especially for those who are sick with coronavirus; for those who suffer in other ways and are named on our Newsletter; for those whose pains and concerns are known to you alone. Empower, we pray, all who care for the sick and suffering, and grant hope to those who have lost it through distress of body or mind. Lord, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer**.
