My Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Many of us would often take some time during these summer months to go away – possibly abroad – and get some well-deserved R&R. Talking to other parents at the school gate today on Sophie's last day of term the mood was more nuanced. The general feeling was that the forthcoming 6 weeks would be a breeze after 14 weeks of a mix of home schooling, full-time working, and the occasional day in the classroom. Most were planning trips within the UK but a significant number were just going to holiday at home and only a few were contemplating getting on a plane and going abroad.
